- 7. Learn from everyone: Show a good countenance to everyone who has something to teach you
- 8. Listen to the needs of each child.
- 9. Friendships must be nourished: Like flowers, they must be watered, or they will wilt
- 10. There is no one too big who cannot be challenged

Miriam was born in Lynnbrook, New York on April 4, 1926. She had a younger brother, Stan. Miriam graduated from University of Michigan with a Bachelor's degree in Political Science and received a Master's degree in English from University Pennsylvania in mid 1960's. She taught English at the Marple Newtown high school for 23 years. For Miriam teaching was not a job, but an avocation and a passion.

Miriam married Phillip Bedein on July 11, 1948. They had 3 children, David, Neal (Nahum) and Helen. David and Nahum made alivah to Israel in the 1970's. Thus, Miriam and Phillip began their yearly pilgrimages to visit their children and to bond with their Israeli born grandchildren.

Miriam was devoted to her family, friends and to Israel. She had a thirst and appreciation for knowledge and was deeply involved with the world and people around her. As her family members, many friends and former students recall, Miriam made an unforgettable impression on all she encountered.

Miriam lived to enjoy her **12 grandchildren and 5 great-grandchildren**.

Despite long distance, she succeeded in building a strong and lasting bond with each one of them - a challenging and admirable accomplishment.
